A PATHWAY TO COLLECTIVE WHOLENESS...

System of Care (AB 2083)

“A System of Care incorporates a broad, flexible array of services and supports for a defined population that is organized into a coordinated network, integrates care planning and management across multiple levels, is culturally and linguistically competent, builds meaningful partnerships with consumers at service delivery, management, and policy levels, and has supportive policy and management infrastructure.”

–SAMHSA

One key function where agencies share Risk, Responsibility, Resources, and Reward is IPC.


IMPORTANT SYSTEM OF CARE CONTEXT

- Care Coordination is a universal function of all healthcare systems.
- Whole Person and No Wrong Door pursuits are dependent on coordination of services and care.
- CA's AB 2083 MOU was designed with 11 elements; 5 of which are **Care Coordination** focused:
 1. Screening and Entry to Care
 2. Teaming and Service Delivery
 3. Interagency Placement Committee
 4. Alignment and Coordination
 5. Training and Implementation of ICPM
- While AB 2083 has initially focused on foster youth with trauma, it's critical to understand that interagency care coordination cannot fall solely to CWS, Probation and MH partners.



CRITICAL LEADERSHIP AWARENESS

- AB 2083's population of focus (Foster youth with trauma) is artificially limiting as a basis for System of Care.
- The use of enhanced and expanded shared service planning is the best way to address the challenges of youth in hotels, county offices, chronic flight behaviors, etc.
- Ensure your ILT and Advisory Teams within System of Care are aware and supportive of any IPC expansion or reengineering efforts.
